**DAR HIGH SCHOOL ESSAY CONTEST 2023–2024**

**NEW THIS YEAR – ALL ESSAYS ARE TO BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY**

<b>TOPIC:</b>	Select a figure from the era of the American Revolution (1773-1783). Discuss how he or she influenced the course of the American Revolution, who he or she was and his/her contribution to the founding of a new nation. Your figure may be any person, whether a well-known figure or an everyday man, woman or child who supported the American Revolution in ways large or small.
<b>PARTICIPANTS:</b>	<b>All grade 9, 10, 11, and 12 students in a public, private, or parochial school, or those who are home schoolers, are eligible.</b> An individual student may submit an entry directly to a DAR chapter if their class or school is not participating. This contest is conducted without regard to race, religion, sex or national origin. <b>DO NOT SUBMIT A STUDENT PHOTOGRAPH WITH ENTRY.</b>
<b>LENGTH:</b>	Length is to be from 800–1,200 words.
<b>FORM:</b>	Essay must be typed or prepared on a computer, using black type in a non-script font no smaller than 12 point or larger than 14 point. A limited vision student may use Braille, a tape recorder, or very large type. In this case, a written transcript must be included, as well as a teacher's or physician's letter attesting to the student's special need. Please note that the entire essay must be the student's original work. This includes all research, writing and editing, which must be done by the student and not by a parent, teacher, tutor or other helper. Essays may only be submitted once to the contest. <u>Each essay must have a title page listing the following:</u> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Title of Essay: "Name of your subject"</li> <li>• A subtitle is permitted if written below the topic.</li> <li>• Contestant's full name and address. (street, rural route, PO Box, city, state, zip code) <u>Note:</u> If the school's regulations prohibit student contact information, then school contact information may be substituted.</li> <li>• Contestant's phone number (with area code) and e-mail address, if available</li> <li>• Name of contestant's school with gradelevel indicated</li> <li>• Name of sponsoring DAR chapter</li> <li>• Number of words in essay</li> </ul>
<b>RESOURCES:</b>	Essay must include a bibliography listing all references utilized. Four or more resources are expected. The bibliography should be cited in a standard, recognized citation style (e.g., APA, Chicago, MLA, etc.). Internet resources, if used, should be cited in the same style, including the electronic address used to access the document as supplementary information. Students are encouraged to use primary sources and cite them. Any essay with information copied directly from sources without using quotes will be disqualified.
<b>JUDGING AND AWARDS:</b>	<b>JUDGING: Judging will be based on historical accuracy, adherence to topic, organization of material, interest, originality, spelling, grammar, neatness and that it is the student's own work. Pictures, maps, drawings, graphics and other such additions will not be considered in judging and should not be included.</b> Judging at the chapter level is by three judges, including at least one non-DAR judge. Judging at other levels is by three judges, all of whom are non-DAR members. <b>CHAPTER:</b> One essay is selected as the chapter winner and forwarded to the state American History chair for state competition. Patriots of the American Revolution essay contest chapter winner certificate and medal may be presented by the chapter if desired. In addition, chapters may present certificates of participation to every student who participates in the essay contest. These supplies are available from The DAR Store. <b>STATE:</b> One essay is selected as the state winner and forwarded to the appropriate national division vice chair of American History for division competition. The state winner receives a silver medal and state winner certificate which are available from The DAR Store. <b>DIVISION:</b> One essay is selected as the division winner and forwarded for national competition to the national vice chair. Division winners are presented a division winner certificate. <b>NATIONAL:</b> One essay is selected as the national winner. A certificate, pin and monetary award is presented to national winner at Continental Congress. The national second and third place winners receive a certificate and a check. Winning essays may appear in official DAR communications. <i>Note: All essays must be submitted to a local chapter <u>electronically</u> by a teacher, school or individual student. Essays sent directly to the national chair or vice chair of the essay contest will not be considered.</i>
<b>DEADLINE:</b>	Chapter chairs should determine date for teachers, schools or individual students to forward essays to the chapter chair to allow for judging to be completed prior to state deadline. <i>States with district level judging should set appropriate intermediate deadlines. Date assigned: December 15, 2023</i>

<b>TOPIC:</b>	On May 14, 1897, John Phillip Sousa played his new march, “The Stars and Stripes Forever.” This song would become the national march of the United States on December 11, 1987. Imagine it is 1897 and you are a newspaper reporter for “The Philadelphia Times.” Your newspaper editor has asked you to write an article about the song being performed that day. Your article needs to tell us about Sousa’s life and the story behind the song. It is the first performance of the song, so make sure your article includes your thoughts about the music and how the audience reacts to what is seen and heard that day.
<b>PARTICIPANTS:</b>	All grade 5, 6, 7, and 8 students in a public, private, or parochial school, or those who are home schoolers, are eligible. An individual student may submit an entry directly to a DAR chapter if their class or school is not participating. This contest is conducted without regard to race, religion, sex, or national origin. <b>DO NOT SUBMIT A STUDENT PHOTOGRAPH WITH ENTRY.</b>
<b>LENGTH:</b>	Grade 5: 300–600 words Grades 6, 7, and 8: 600–1,000 words
<b>FORM:</b>	Essay is to be prepared on a computer, using black type in a non-script font no smaller than 12 point or larger than 14 point. A limited vision student may use Braille, a tape recorder, or very large type. A written transcript must be included, as well as a teacher’s or physician’s letter attesting to the student’s special need. Please note that the entire essay must be the student’s original work. This includes all research, writing, and editing, which must be done by the student themselves and not by a parent, teacher, tutor, or other helper. Each essay must include a <b>completed Submission Form</b> .
<b>RESOURCES:</b>	Essay must have a list of all resources utilized. Four individual resources are expected. Internet resources, if used, should include the electronic address. <b>** Any essay with information copied directly from sources without using quotes (plagiarized) will be disqualified. **</b>
<b>JUDGING AND AWARDS:</b>	Judging will be based on historical accuracy, adherence to topic, organization of material, interest, originality, spelling, grammar, and that it is the student’s own work. Pictures, maps, drawings, graphics, and other such additions <i>will not</i> be considered in judging and should not be included. Judging at the chapter level is by three judges, including at least one non-DAR judge. Judging at other levels is by three judges, all of whom are non-DAR members.  <b>CHAPTER:</b> One essay at each grade level is selected as the chapter winner and forwarded to the state American History chair for state competition. American History essay contest chapter winner certificates and bronze medals may be presented by the chapter if desired. In addition, chapters may present certificates of participation to every student who participates in the essay contest. These supplies are available from the DAR Store.  <b>STATE:</b> One essay at each grade level is selected as the state winner and forwarded to the appropriate national division vice chair of American History for division competition. The state winner receives a silver medal and state winner certificate.  <b>DIVISION:</b> One essay in each grade is selected as the division winner and forwarded for national competition to the national vice chair. Division winners are presented a division winner certificate.  <b>NATIONAL:</b> One essay in each grade is selected as the national winner. A certificate, gold pin and monetary award is presented to each national winner at Continental Congress in June 2023. Winning essays may appear in official DAR communications.  <i>Note: All essays must be submitted to a local chapter electronically by a teacher, school or individual student. Essays sent directly to the national chair or vice chair of the essay contest will not be considered.</i>
<b>DEADLINE:</b>	Chapter chairs should determine date for teachers, schools or individual students to forward essays to them to the chapter chair to allow for judging to be completed prior to state deadline. States with district level judging should set appropriate intermediate deadlines. Date assigned: <b>December 15, 2023</b>
