#### ANNOUNCEMENTS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Councilman Roth reminded residents of the September 26<sup>th</sup> Hazardous Waste Day.

Colonel Gary Machina, Heron Place, spoke live via webcam from Camp Victory, Baghdad, Iraq. His family and friends were in attendance at the Town Board meeting. Supervisor Barrett expressed the town's thanks and appreciation for his service. Colonel Machina's wife presented a Town of Clifton Park flag that was flown over the Al Faw Palace in Baghdad on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. A video was also shown of the Colonel and his staff throwing out the first pitch via webcam at a Mets game.

Matt Duddy, Vice President and General Manager of Lamar Advertising, introduced Linda Champion of the Kathleen A. Champion Foundation and Leah Snyder, Shen student in Sally Way's design class and winner of the billboard contest sponsored by the Foundation. The billboard is located on Route 9. Ms. Champion explained the purpose of the Kathleen A Champion Foundation is to raise DWI awareness and to support crime victims. She expressed appreciation at being part of the project. Leah Snyder explained the idea behind the design is "Message in a Bottle".

#### PRESENTATION TO THE BOARD

Michael Passantino, President and CEO of Energenics Systems, a renewable energy service provider that designs, finances, integrates, owns and maintains advanced distributed renewable energy technology systems, proposed to the Town Board a power and energy storage system to

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maximize energy efficiency from the closed landfill as well as the ice arena. The company is looking at a fifty-year land lease. He stated there would be no cost to the town except for the feasibility study. Mr. Passantino said the company has a digestive gas system that takes the methane out of mulch and converting it into renewable energy through their co-generation system which will alleviate odors from the mulch. He reported the town, NYSERDA and the local utility will put up money and Energenics Systems will make up the difference for the feasibility study which will take 30 to 60 days.

Supervisor Barrett stated this could be a groundbreaking venture. He explained this would be putting solar panels on top of the capped landfill.

Mr. Passantino said the landfill cap is not penetrated, therefore, there are no DEC issues.

Supervisor Barrett noted NYSERDA has come out with a \$30,000 grant.

Mr. Passantino said his company is looking for the town to support this venture up to \$15,000 for the feasibility study. He reported Energenics and NYSERDA will match those dollars. If it was felt the project was not feasible, the town would be reimbursed the money. He feels there is a better than 80 percent chance of the project moving forward if the town works with the company. Mr. Passantino said the federal government is waiting for viable projects to use stimulus money. He reported NYSERDA is willing to support this project, noting it would be the first one in New York State.

Councilman Roth said he sees this as an investment particularly if odors can be eliminated.

Town Attorney McCarthy asked what the total cost will be for the feasibility study.

Mr. Pasantino responded \$35,000 to \$45,000.

Mr. McCarthy said it will be necessary to see if the landfill cap can support the weight of the infrastructure.

Mr. Passantino responded Energenics Systems will write the study with the town's input and would like the town to appoint a Project Manager.

Mr. McCarthy said it is important that the town know the level of details and may choose to have its own consultant who will also have 100 percent access to the information. He reported the Office of the State Comptroller has done a management audit on six local projects akin to what is being proposed for the ice arena and is supportive of those projects.

Councilman Hughes stated he is very supportive of cutting edge eco-friendly green technology, particularly since this project can produce a revenue stream for the town and if this reduces dependence on foreign oil, it has his strong support.

Supervisor Barrett said energy storing is a most important aspect and noted being able to turn an unused piece of property into a revenue producing property is very exciting. He said Environmental Specialist Montague will work directly with Mr. Passantino.

Mr. McCarthy asked if a Letter of Intent is the next step. Mr. Passantino said the next step is Town Board support of funding the feasibility study, followed by a formal Letter of Intent for the feasibility study.

Mr. Montague is to get in touch with Mr. Passantino with contact information.

PUBLIC HEARING, 7:10 PM (8:23 p.m.)  
TO CONSIDER A LOCAL LAW ADDING ARTICLE XIV, SECTION 208-80  
OUTDOOR WOOD BURNING BOILERS TO THE TOWN CODE

The Town Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing as published in The Daily Gazette on July 13, 2009.

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Councilman Roth said one of the most important aspects of this legislation is type of fuel to be used. He said the legislation speaks to grandfathering in current boilers but requires a permit. He stated this legislation will protect residents of the community.

Supervisor Barrett stated he doesn't want to affect anyone currently using wood burning boilers in a negative way and doesn't want to restrict boilers in areas where residents have more acreage, but does think it should be restricted in densely populated developments.

Director of Building and Development Myers reported at this time DEC is the enforcement branch. He said he has only received one complaint on these boilers.

Supervisor Barrett stated he doesn't see the current wood boilers as a problem.

Councilman Hughes said he would not want to see a situation where someone who currently has the structure, especially where there is considerable acreage, has to go back and retrofit the boilers in order to be compliant. He asked that the Board be sensitive to that and that current owners be grandfathered in. He doesn't feel this is a huge problem.

Mr. Myers said he thinks there are only about a half dozen boilers in town but gets one or two inquiries a month asking about regulations. He noted there are several different levels of boilers. He explained the boilers are combustion chambers with a water tank around it, the water is heated and feeds the house hot water system or hot water heat. The general cost runs between \$8000 and \$12,000.

Councilman Paolucci said he thought the reason this was being brought up was to have some regulation regarding neighborhoods. He agrees that current boilers should be grandfathered in. He referred to provision 4 that states existing boilers would require a permit and asked if this is in addition to the original permit applied for when installed. Mr. Myers responded this would be for those without permits. Councilman Paolucci asked that the language be clarified.

Supervisor Barrett said some of the proposed legislation needs clarification. He stated this will not be voted on in the near future and probably will require another public hearing.

Councilwoman Walowit agreed that Section 4 needs clarification. She was under the impression this was being done with regard to future installations and not existing boilers that are using the proper fuel and not creating problems. She would like to see existing boilers grandfathered in.

Mr. McCarthy said the primary change from the last public hearing is to eliminate references in section 5 to standards promulgated by the Northeast State for Coordinated Air Use Management and the NYS Attorney General's Office as these entities do not currently regulate the boilers. The proposed legislation sets out that the ZBA can grant a variance. Mr. Myers noted a boiler in a subdivision would require a significant area variance. Mr. McCarthy said he wants to make sure the ZBA has clear direction on what standards apply.

Mr. McCarthy and Mr. Myers reviewed Section 5 – Specific Requirements – particularly the minimum four acres requirement and 200 foot setback and noted this needs to be reviewed.

Councilwoman Walowit questioned the limited months of operation, particularly if a resident is using the boiler to heat water. Mr. Myers responded this seems to be the standard that municipalities are using because of the effect it has on neighbors during the warmer weather.

The public hearing was opened for comments from the audience at 8:45 p.m.

Bob Mackey, Male Drive, stated it is a lot better to use our own resources than depend Middle East oil. He said people purchasing wood are contributing to the local economy and noted the wood burning boiler is one of the best purchases he ever made. He is concerned that there might be too many restrictions on the whole wood stove process. He explained he heats his water thru his boiler and is concerned about the summer months' restriction. Mr. Mackey said he is relieved that comments were made regarding grandfathering existing boilers, noting his investment was over \$20,000. He said the public should be concerned with people that would burn garbage or pressure treated wood.

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Kevin Bowman, Sugar Hill Road, reported he owns two boilers. He said the proposed legislation doesn't exempt existing boilers from meeting EPA Phase II. He expressed concern with the months of operation as he heats his water with the boiler. Speaking with regard to minimum lot size, he explained though the woodstove sits on the one acre lot where his house is situated, he also owns an additional 98 acres around the house and asked if something can be written into the legislation that would address that type of situation. Mr. Bowman thinks the smoke issue is more hearsay than actual fact.

Pam Marshall, Fairlawn Court, said the set back requirements need review.

The Town Clerk read a letter, attached, from Richard Peek, Waite Road, Clifton Park, in support of legislating outdoor wood burning boilers.

Dwayne Lindsey, Grooms Road, reported he heats with wood and burns year round for heat, as well as for hot water. He doesn't agree with the 200 foot setback. He feels the legislation is too restrictive. He reported his boiler is approximately 50 feet off the road but 500 feet from the nearest house. Mr. Lindsey said if the town is going to control outdoor woodstoves then they need to look at fire places and indoor woodstoves.

Paul Kitchen, Sugar Hill Road, said he appreciates the Town Board comments this evening. He reported he has 5 acres but his property is "L" shaped and there is no way he could put the boiler any place on his property and be in compliance with the proposed legislation. Mr. Kitchen stated an outdoor wood burning boiler is an alternative fuel. He asked that the permit requirement for existing boilers be eliminated. He questioned what will be required if a new boiler is needed.

Supervisor Barrett said he believes the Town Board will not require anything of existing boilers.

Mr. McCarthy said the proposed legislation has been taken from a number of municipalities and he will speak with the Queensbury Town Attorney tomorrow.

Mr. Kitchen said this is heavy handed, noting suspension of permit and penalties. He noted NYS does not mandate that towns regulate the boilers. He also stated there is no way to retrofit a boiler.

Supervisor Barrett stated based on comments received this evening, he does not see a vote anytime in the near future and another public hearing would have to be held.

Everyone was given an opportunity to speak in favor of or against the proposed local law and no one else wished to be heard. Supervisor Barrett declared the public hearing closed at 9:14 p.m.

WHEREAS, the Town of Clifton Park Dwaas Kill Nature Preserve Working Group was appointed in 2008 to prepare a Concept and Management Plan, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Clifton Park Dwaas Kill Nature Preserve Working Group represented Clifton Park residents, Shenendehowa School District, environmental educators, the County of Saratoga, conservation groups and neighbors of the preserve, and

WHEREAS, significant public input has been received throughout the preparation of the Dwaas Kill Nature Preserve 2009 Concept and Management Plan through two public meetings in 2008, and

WHEREAS, the goals of the Dwaas Kill Nature Preserve 2009 Concept & Management Plan outlined in the Open Space Plan's goals, were noted in the New York State Open Space Plan and the Saratoga County Green Infrastructure Plan, and

WHEREAS, the Town Board will continue to work with the Open Space, Trails and Riverfront Committees in order to achieve the goals outlined in the Plan; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board hereby adopts the Town of Clifton Park Dwaas Kill Nature Preserve 2009 Concept & Management Plan.

Councilman Hughes stated this is a unique ecological habitat and a basis for scientific research.

Supervisor Barrett announced the next Bio-Blitz will be held at the 250 acre Dwaas Kill Nature Preserve.

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Resolution No. 211 of 2009, a resolution authorizing the Clifton Park Town Board to apply for a grant from the County of Saratoga for the 78 acres of forest now known as the Carrese Property.

Introduced by Councilwoman Walowit, who moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Paolucci.

WHEREAS, Saratoga County has announced a grant opportunity for its Farmland/ Open Space Preservation Program for Open Space Protection Projects with a submittal deadline of July 30, 2009, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Clifton Park Open Space, Trails, and Riverfront Committee and Land Acquisition subcommittee, is interested in acquiring and protecting this 78+/- acre area off Ballston Lake Rd./ NYS Rt. 146A, with the overall goal of increasing town protected open space in western Clifton Park, and

WHEREAS, the landowners submitted a Letter of Interest for selling their land to the Town of Clifton Park in January of 2009, and

WHEREAS, this area is adjacent to other Town of Clifton Park parklands of Veterans Memorial Park and would create a contiguous area of Town protected open space property, and

WHEREAS, the land is of interest as it was formerly a managed forest and contains a number of logging roads which could be used as trails and contains the headwaters of the Cooley-Kill, and

WHEREAS, the parcel of land is in a growing area of the Town near the Fairway Woods Subdivision off MacElroy Road and NYS 146A which, when completed, will contain about 101 dwelling units adjacent to the said property, and

WHEREAS, the acquisition of said land in the Town of Clifton Park is in accordance with the 2006 Town of Clifton Park Comprehensive Plan, the 2003 Town of Clifton Park Open Space Plan, the 2005 Western Clifton Park Land Conservation Plan, Generic Environmental Impact Statement and 1997 Saratoga County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Program, and

WHEREAS, the execution of the grant application does not commit the Town of Clifton Park to a definite course or to appropriate the local share, but offers the Town of Clifton Park an opportunity to gather sufficient information to formulate the proposed action and make future decisions, and

WHEREAS, the Town shall also pursue and attract, for deposit and use, where permitted by the Laws of the State of New York, additional funds, gifts and grants from foundations, any private and additional public sources as well as federal, state and county matching funds; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Clifton Park Town Board authorizes the Supervisor and or his staff to oversee the execution of and filing of the 2009 grant application for matching grant funds from the County of Saratoga in accordance with the provisions of the Saratoga County Farmland Open Space Protection Program; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Supervisor and or his staff is authorized to take such steps as necessary to progress the Open Space Project, including but not limited to, developing a purchase/sale contract, upon the Town Attorney approval, indicating willingness and good faith to advance the project and provide all parties with adequate information, obtaining a proposal, title report, survey, and negotiating a land acquisition at said site pursuant to the grant and subject to Town Board approval.

Supervisor Barrett noted this parcel is contiguous with Veterans Memorial Park.

WHEREAS, Highway Superintendent Kukuk is requesting that the Town Board consider authorizing supplemental funding for the paving of the roads identified in Exhibit "A", and

WHEREAS, the Town Board recognizes the importance of maintaining the roads in the Town of Clifton Park for the safety of its residents; now, therefore, be it

Superintendent of Highways Kukuk explained the cost of pavement averages about \$100,000 per mile, noting there are 209 miles of town roads. Superintendent Kukuk said he has surplus funds in the Highway fund which will match the town dollars.

WHEREAS, no other vendors submitted a proposal in response to the request for proposal, and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has allocated \$65,000 for Bulk Waste Pick Up in A-8160-50 (General Fund Transfer Station-Bulk Pick Up) and will require a transfer of \$41,750 to cover the cost of \$106,750 for the Bulk Trash Pick Up; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board accepts the proposal from County Waste in an amount of \$106,750 to complete a full residential curbside Bulk Trash Pick Up for all residents within the Town of Clifton Park; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Town Board appropriates up to \$106,750 for Bulk Waste Pick Up, with a transfer of \$41,750 from Un-appropriated Fund Balance to A-8160-050 for such purpose.

Director of Community Development McHugh explained more than 20 trash haulers were contacted, 12 firms indicated interest and only one proposal was submitted. Supervisor Barrett noted pickup will also be done at all apartment complexes.

Mr. Ballout asked if the town plans on having a public forum regarding the Kids Korner. Supervisor Barrett responded the town will continue to work through the process.

Sarah Coons, Vischer Ferry Road, speaking with regard to Kids Korner reported the new material that Leathers & Associates is using does not splinter and is eco-friendly. She reviewed

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maintenance involved with Leathers playground. She reviewed Leather & Associates building options.

Jim Baisley, Barkwood Drive, expressed appreciation to the Town Board for all that is being done for veterans, particularly this evening's webcast with Colonel Machina.
