ANNOUNCEMENTS & COMMUNICATIONS

Supervisor Barrett announced, as part of the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors, the County has started “Healthy Saratoga County”. This initiative will be presenting a series of events and activities with intentions for sustaining activity, diet, and anything to prepare for life, being in the best shape as possible and what we put in our body. He announced an upcoming “Health and Safety Day”, will be held at the Clifton Park Center Mall this Saturday, March 23 from Noon-3 PM. This event will include Narcan training and distribution, first aid and CPR training/information. Supervisor thanked Clifton Park Halfmoon EMS and the Saratoga County Department of Health for their efforts with this event. He stated information on upcoming events in April will be posted on the Saratoga County website.

PRESENTATIONS-Clifton Park Soup Contest & Betty the Yeti Contest Winners

Supervisor Barrett presented to the winner of the Clifton Park Soup Contest a plaque for 1st Place winner to the Owner and Chef of Powers Inn & Pub. The winning soup, Irish Chowder, was created by Chef Betty Goodall.

PRESENTATION-Friends of Open Space

Susan Burton, Director of Friends of Open Space, presented information about a Greenbelt for Western Clifton Park. Ms. Burton presented History of the Open Space Project, Top Priorities, Importance of Securing Additional Land for Drinking Water Quality, Importance of additional conservation of farmland and viable agriculture, importance of securing additional conservation of unique natural areas, wildlife habitats and areas for passive recreation. Ms. Burton reviewed the 2004 potential buildout without restricted development and potential future buildout after Land Conservation Plan, Western CP GEIS Design Guidelines, Land Use Planning, and the importance of the Town should allocate a portion of any future surplus revenues towards open space conservation from 2007. Natural Resource Value of Land in Western Clifton Park, "Anchor Points" in Western Clifton Park. Ms. Burton gave a summary and a call to action of why open spaces are so important, Government Programs & Actions, and the Vision for Western Clifton Park. Friends of Clifton Park Open Space has long pursued sound, productive open space policies to encourage balancing the pressures of development with the advantages of open space. Ms. Burton explained the Friends envisions a Green Belt connecting the permanently preserved parcels in Western Clifton Park. The Friends requested Town Board support in moving this vision closer to reality as Clifton Park grows and develops over the coming decades. She stated so much work has already been done, and tools enacted to implement this widely supported vision for our Town. Clerk Note: see attached.

Supervisor Barrett stated, when the Town started planning for the open space preservation effort in 2000 there was a lot of skepticism and concern by many residents. The combination of the surveys and outreach opportunities to large landowners and those interested through Town meetings where the effort was discussed, more residents began to understand what the Town was trying to do and it's the public support that is needed to begin an initiative like this. He stated the Town has over 2,000 acres of property permanently preserved, and another 2,000 acres in temporary easements. Supervisor Barrett thanked the Open Space team over the years for all their hard work, knowledge and efforts for their success. He explained the Town was able to create new parks, nature preserves and trails, and keep within budget. Certainly, a testament to property planning and an aggressive grant acquisition program. The GEIS set forth used less units in the western part of Town, but keep in mind those units, even recently, are worth more because of simple supply and demand. Supervisor stated it's good to see goals set, even over a long period of time, become reality. Supervisor stated the Town does have a new competitor when it comes to preservation of property, and that is Green Energy. Landowners have been contacted by energy companies with a vast amount of taxpayer's monies, have been going into the energy industry offering landowners breaks. Municipalities really can't compete. It has always been important to have the buy-in from the landowners to the open space program and partnership with the Town. Supervisor stated the Town will continue to have meaningful conversations with landowners on preserving open space. Supervisor thanked the many landowners in the western part of Clifton Park who are a part of preserving the open space.

Resolution No. 61 of 2024, a resolution declaring lead agency and referring application to amend Wood Road Findings Statement to the Planning Board for review.

Introduced by Councilwoman Reid, who moved its adoption, seconded by Councilman Morelli.

WHEREAS, on November 25, 1991, the Planning Board adopted a Findings Statement for a Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Wood Road Corridor related to an application from Northern Distributing to construct a Beverage Distribution facility, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to paragraph 41 of the Findings Statement, the Planning Board determined that a portion of the property that was the subject of the Northern Distributing Company application should be protected, to the extent practicable, for the purpose of encouraging habitat for endangered species of butterfly then found to occur at the site, and required the applicant to develop a Habitat Management Plan for a designated area for such purpose, as shown on Drawing WH-1, attached to the Findings Statement, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the findings statement, DCG Development Company, as owner of the subject property, prepared a Habitat Management Plan designed to preserve a 1.86 ± acre portion of the subject property encompassing areas designated as 3-A and 3-B of the property as depicted on the Plan, and

WHEREAS, on January 19, 2024, DCG Development Co. filed an application requesting the preparation and consideration of a Supplemental Draft GEIS, to amend the Findings Statement, to consider whether circumstances affecting the potential environmental impacts, which were the subject of the Habitat Plan, have materially changed relative to the designated areas 3-A and 3-B on the site, and

WHEREAS, the Town Board wishes to establish a process to review and consider the application; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board declares Lead Agency Status for an application to consider a Supplemental Draft GEIS for the Wood Road Corridor, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the evaluation of the application constitutes a Type I Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR (New York Codes, Rules and Regulations) 617.4; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the application is referred to the Planning Board to consider whether to perfect the Supplemental Draft Generic Environmental Impact Statement and any recommended alternative mitigation alternatives.

Planning & Zoning Director John Scavo explained, the Wood Road GEIS is approximately thirty years old. Over that time there has been data collected by Wildlife Biologist. This would give the Town the opportunity to look at the data, the habitat of where it was thirty years ago, what the set asides have been along Wood Road as a result of development projects, looking at Lupine plants that have been identified populations, and looking at the viability of those populations have grown or decreased in size, as were sustained in numbers. Mr. Scavo stated all this was done for potential reintroduction of Blue Karner Butterflies. The Planning Board will look at the data and make recommendations back to the Town Board, as Lead Agency, on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement whether a supplemental is warranted, if so, what recommendations may be considered and what are the current environmental protections, stressors that are in the Wood Road corridor today that will show the transitions in that area.

Nancy Bellamy, Eastside Drive, voiced concerns with a “new drug” the EMS have been finding, that it would sometimes take EMS three applications of Narcan and still couldn’t bring them out of it and hopes a new application can be produced to help the combating the new drug.

Supervisor Barrett stated the County Board of Health are aware of the “new drugs” and is one of the reason the County has initiated the presence of speakers and peer advocates in the schools.

No one else wished to be heard. Public Privilege closed at 8:17 PM.
